Presidents Corner



One Man's Opinion

Recently there has been a proposal by other radio amateurs to reduce the size of the present 75/80 meter phone band. The proposal asked that the region from 3600khz to 3650khz be fully restored to non voice modes.

At the present time hams can operate on 75/80 voice modes all the way down to 3.600 khz. When this expansion was first introduced we all thought it would be a great idea. I can recall operating only CW in the Novice bands from 3.700khz to 3.750Khz in my first few months as a young Novice operator.

In time, this expansion of the phone band has proven to be a mistake, based on the fact that digital and non voice modes have grown a lot in the last few years.

The complaints that I have heard are SSB stations interfering with non-voice modes due to the little space they now have on the 75/80 meter band.

Personally, it has not been a problem for me, my interest in this band has been very little in the last twenty years. However, would I want the CW bands open to phone ops in the twenty, fifteen, or ten meter bands? No, I would not, first of all it causes conflict and unnecessary interference.

The 75 meter phone band is 400Khz wide, one of the wider bands we have, by reducing the band by 50 kHz still gives one 350Khz for phone operation. In fact the proposal states the area in question should be Extra Class only and not open to all classes. On that point I agree also with the change and say why not? I am still in favor of doing something with the 40 meter phone band as well, no one has yet to propose any changes on this band as well.

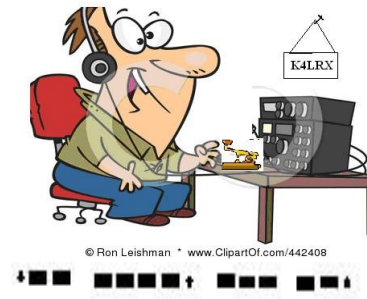
So, if we give up 50 kHz on 75/80 then a fair trade would be to extend the 40 meter band down to 7.100

to 7.125 KHZ for Extra Class only and establish an Extra section on ten CW of the first twenty five Khz, 28.000 to 28.025 KHZ.

To me this makes the digital ops on 75 happy, Extra's will have an additional sub band on 40 and ten meters. Doubt it will happen this way, but nice thought.

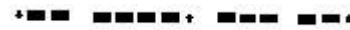


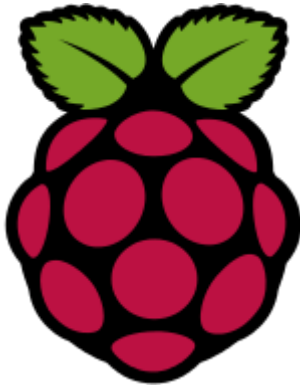
Elections

Let Mark KC9TYA, Len N9QVQ and Herb KB9MZH know if you would like to serve as an officer or know of someone who would.

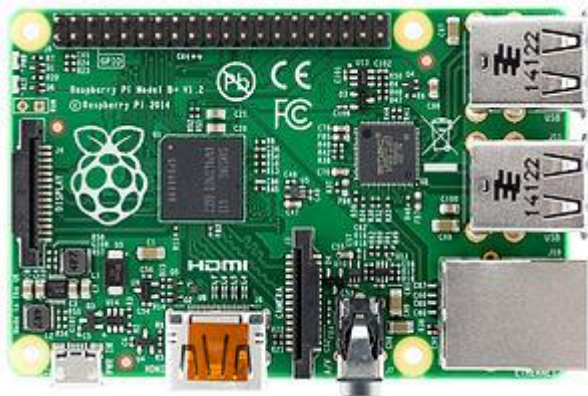
We have plenty of Indians, we need some Chiefs. Help do your part to make this a successful club.
